## From the Pastor's Desk

Recently I was having a conversation with a young couple from the area. Their story was a compelling one: after a lifetime of broken relationships, run-ins with the law, and drug abuse, they met Jesus (and one another), and their lives started to turn around. I rejoiced with them in how God's grace had been at work in their lives and asked them, since they were now believers, where they attended church. "We haven't gone anywhere for years now," they replied, "we used to go somewhere, but we felt like they were judging our parenting. We didn't have great role models growing up, and we thought that church was supposed to be a place where we could be ourselves and people would understand that we don't have it all figured out yet."

Naturally, I told the couple that they would always be welcome at Hillside. They asked, "Is it the kind of place where we won't be judged for not being perfect parents and where we can struggle openly with what it means to be a disciple?" The only thing I could think to say was, "I believe so, and I certainly hope so." But their question gave me pause because I have heard stories from some of our own young people about times when they felt unwelcome in their own church.

At our most recent presbytery meeting, our executive presbyter, the Rev. Dr. Ralph Hawkins, led us in a discussion about the struggles of having multiple generations represented in a congregation. The conversation recognized that, for many of us, the highest value in many of our churches for many years has been doing our duty and being reverent. Now many churches are struggling with how to balance those values with being welcoming.

I was reminded of my first experience with a Roman Catholic mass when I was a thirteen year -old attending a Catholic school. In most Presbyterian churches I had been a part of growing up, we chatted with those around us until the service was ready to begin, so, naturally, I was behaving the only way I knew how, quietly making small talk with my neighbors while waiting for worship to start. Before I knew what happened, a nun sitting in front of me spun around like a top and, with her face red and contorted with rage, screamed at me, "YOU WILL BE SILENT IN THE HOUSE OF THE LORD!" The words echoed off the cathedral walls as all of my classmates turned to stare at me as the horror and embarrassment of what had just happened became burned in my memory forever. Needless to say, it would be years before I willingly stepped foot in a cathedral or felt welcome at a Catholic mass.

I hope my experience can be instructive for how we as a congregation welcome outsiders into our midst because my assumption is that most young people will not have the same understanding or values about how to behave in church. We now live in a society where the majority of young people do not attend church and a significant percentage have no knowledge of what it is to be

"reverent" in worship; fewer still believe that it is their "duty" to attend at all. For the young people who do come to worship on a regular basis, I can assure you that they are in a minority of their friends. Like the couple I spoke with recently, most of them are looking for a place where they can be honest about the struggles in their lives, and for most of them, they had so many different choices for what to do on Sunday morning that convincing their family that worship is worth the extra effort made it a struggle to show up at all.

Now the question is, when we do find some young people in our church who may not share our values or (even if they do) are struggling to follow (and get their children to follow) our unspoken rules about what it means to be reverent towards God, how are we to treat them? I certainly share the belief that worship is a time to honor God, and it is one of the only times in my day-to-day life where I am dressed up and well-behaved. But as much as I value acting in such a way as to honor God, I believe that God is honored when we are welcoming and gracious to those who are struggling to honor God in their own lives. I would encourage each of us to think about how we might want to be treated if we were outsiders or just struggling in our day-to-day lives. Angry stares and harsh words are hurtful and send a message that the family is not welcome.

That being said, church is a place where we help one another to grow as disciples, so there is a time and place to help one another do better. Allow me to suggest that a better way to help young families in our community is to befriend them. Advice, when needed, is gererally better received from someone we know loves us without question, but an offer to help is generally received even better. An understanding smile and a simple, "Is there anything I can do to help you?" is a way to serve others, make a stressful situation better, and make the family feel welcome all at the same time. However we choose to treat our young families, the goal should always be to encourage them, help them to grow as disciples, and make them feel like Hillside is a great place to call home.

I hope that in the years to come we will see many previously unchurched families coming to worship, but this naturally means that life might get messy. When it does, I am confident that Hillside will be a place where young people will feel welcome, even if their manners aren't perfect.



# Recipe Corner



#### SIMPLE ASIAN GLAZED **CHICKEN THIGHS**

6 chicken thighs

1/3 cup rice wine vinegar

 $\frac{1}{4}$  cup oy sauce

3 TBL hone

2 TBL brown sugar

2 TBL sesame oil

4 garlic cloves, crushed

1 teaspoon fresh ginger, grated

Sliced green onions

Heat oven to 425°.

Whisk together vinegar, soy sauce, honey, brown sugar, oil, garlic and ginger.

Bring to a rolling boil. Reduce heat to low and simmer until thickened.

Place chicken in a baking dish, cover with 2/3 of sauce and turn to cover evenly.

Cook skin side down 30 minutes.

Turn and cook 15 minutes.

Change oven setting to broil. Broil until deep golden brown, about 5 minutes

Allow chicken to rest 10 minutes. Serve with additional sauce and green onions.


