From the Pastor's Desk

While even a cursory glance at human history could easily tell you that racial conflict has been a staple of almost every society on the face of the earth, recurring events in our own country has made it clear that racial tensions have been on the rise nationally in recent years. Although it may seem like these problems are mainly "elsewhere" because our little corner of the world is somewhat homogenous with a population that is 97% white, we should remind ourselves what Christianity teaches about race and be prepared to speak up to share the good news whenever the opportunity arises. So let's review:

A brief racial history of God's Word:

- Genesis 1:28 "God created mankind in his own image... male and female he created them." From the beginning, God has made it clear that every human being, from every race, bears his image, and so all lives are sacred to God.
- Genesis 9:1 God blessed Noah and his sons, saying to them, "be fruitful and increase in number and fill the earth." It may be a simple reminder, but we are blood relatives (however distant) to every human being alive. Any group we consider to be "those people" are actually our cousins.
- Genesis 11:9 "the Lord confused the language of the whole world [and] scattered them over the face of the whole earth." Although we often are mistrustful of people who are different from us (I'm keeping my eye on those sneaky Canadians), God created all people groups and languages, and the cultures that sprung from them are part of his design for the earth. Every culture has strengths and weaknesses, so we need one another if we ever hope to grow into the people God has called us to be.
- Jonah 4 The Lord had commanded Jonah to preach to Nineveh, but he ran away instead because he was racist. The people of Nineveh were bloodthirsty murderers from a different race and culture, and Jonah had what he thought were good reasons to hate them for being different and evil. The entire saga is about God's love for "those people" and concludes with God saying, "should I not have concern for the great city?" God loves the people we think are different and unworthy, which is lucky for us because our own culture is very different and unworthy compared to God's original "chosen people" of Israel.
- Acts 15:6-11 When there was racial tension in the early church between the Hebrew believers and the Greek believers, the apostles discerned, and Peter said, "God, who knows the heart, showed that he accepted them by giving the Holy Spirit to them, just as he did to us. He did not discriminate between us and them, for he purified their hearts by faith." That one seems pretty self-explanatory.

Galatians 3:7, 26-29 - Paul reminds us that in God's mind there are only 2 races: those who are part of the family of God and those who are not, "understand, then, that those who have faith are children of Abraham... so in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith... there is neither Jew nor Greek..." Whatever race and identity you had from birth is overwritten by our new identity in Christ, meaning that people from every race are members of Christ's body first and foremost, and members of their own race secondarily.

Revelation 7:9 - "before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people, and language, standing before the throne and before the lamb. They were wearing white robes..." One of the most awkward things about racism is that we are told that God's Kingdom is a place where all of God's people, from every race, live together in harmony. If we claim citizenship in God's Kingdom, then harboring ill will toward other races has no place in us.

Of course, all of this is to say that when we see racism or systematic injustice of any kind, it is our duty to intervene because "them is us." Any group we might think to call "those people" are our brothers, sisters, and cousins, and Scripture calls us to treat them as we would want to be treated. On the one hand, I feel like this should all go without saying, and on the other hand, given our current political landscape, it needs to be said.

Recipe Corner



ZUCCHILATTAS (ZUCCHINI ENCHILADAS)

2 TBL. butter

1 ½ lbs. zucchini, sliced

1 lb. mushrooms, sliced

1 onion, sliced

1 ½ lbs. tomatoes, chopped

Salt and pepper to taste

1 ½ lbs. Monterey Jack cheese

Flour tortillas

Preheat oven to 350°. Lightly grease a 9x13 pan.

Melt butter over medium heat.

Mix together zucchini, mushrooms, onion, tomatoes, salt and pepper. Add to skillet, cook and stir until vegetables are tender.

Warm tortillas in preheated oven, 2-3 minutes Fill warm tortillas with vegetable mixture and cheese, reserving some of each for topping. Place seam side down in baking dish, top with reserved vegetables and cheese. Bake 15 minutes.


